Violence among police has become a rapidly occurring topic within communities. Tensions have escalated in some communities and led to protests and sometimes riots.

Sinclair's Career Communities of Public Safety and Justice and Liberal Arts and Social Sciences hosted University of Cincinnati Professor Todd Callais.

Callais presented a look at his research on police, race and trust in the United States. He included a look at the history of policing and where is it today.



Callais said that he was inspired to do his research by seeing the information that young people were getting after several police shootings.

"I think it was, to be honest, seeing the online reaction to the Ferguson issues and the Trayvon Martin case," he said. "Basically, when you would see how the dissemination of information online and the way that especially younger generations were learning about police violence to me was incredibly problematic.

"When I started to look more and more how hard it was to find reliable data so coming together



to actually really spend time and making sure and certifying that things were correct and then trying to get that out there. I think that's what was important to me."

According to Callais, police violence is not a phenomenon that has sprung up in the last several years. However, Callais noted that younger generations tend to think of police violence as something new.

"They might think that because these stories come in waves, that this is a new thing... when in reality this is something that we see two to three times a decade," Callais said.

However, Callais said that this

"The values our Parliament represents – democracy, freedom, human rights, the rule of law – command the admiration and respect of free people everywhere... That is why it is a target for those who reject those values," Prime Minister of the U.K., Theresa May, said in an address after London experienced a terrorist attack on March 22.

Khalid Masood, a British man and citizen who was born Adrian Ajao, drove his car into pedestrians on Westminster Bridge, resulting in three fatalities. Masood then attempted to crash into Parliament armed with two knives. Masood killed one police officer, Keith Palmer, who was unarmed during the incident.

Foreign office minister Tobias Ellwood performed mouth-to-mouth resuscitation on Palmer. Photographs revealed Ellwood's face and hands to be bloody. He lost his brother in a terror attack in Bali in 2002.

"He was utterly heroic, pure and simple. He went above and beyond and did all he could to save a police officer," said Liberal Democrat leader Tim Farron.

Among the fatalities was U.S. citizen, Kurt Cochran of Utah. Tens of others were injured in the attack.

May said that the perpetrator was involved in an investigation conducted by the British intelligence agency MI5 in 2005.

"He was a peripheral figure and the case is historic...there was no prior intelligence of his intent or the plot," May said. The Metropolitan Police stressed the importance of the public's assistance in uncovering potential ties to the subject.

Masood had spent time in Saudi Arabia in 2005. Masood also had an extensive criminal record with instances of grievous bodily harm and owning an Terror continued on page 3

Westbrook, Harden top off 36 minutes the MVP ladder during regular

With the regular season of NBA nearing its end along with postseason and finals looming, MVP picks are starting to climb the ladder to reach the top. The top ten feature players who not only have some of the highest statistics, both for their team and compared to other players, but contribute to the overall performance of their team.

The top two players in the race are tied for first – Russell Westbrook and James Harden.

Westbrook, guard for Oklahoma City Thunder, has stayed at the top of the ladder consistently for the past few months. With an average play time of 34 minutes during regular season, he has managed a triple-double this season. His average is 34 points per game with 10 rebounds and 10 assists.

Harden is a guard for the Houston Rockets and has stayed at the top of the ladder since week 11 began in January. He is averaging a double-double with 29 points per game and 11 assists. His play time averages

season. He

has a plus/minus contribution of five.

The third man on the ladder is LeBron James, forward for Cleveland Cavaliers. James plays an average of 37 minutes per game and scores 26 points. His team contribution is a seven plus/minus. He has fluctuated in the top five since January.

Kawhi Leonard comes behind James in the fourth spot but has moved up from the eighth spot a few months ago. Leonard is a forward for the San Antonio Spurs and averages 26 points and 33 minutes of play time. His plus/minus contribution to the Spurs is six.

Boston Celtics guard, Isaiah Thomas, rounds out the top five spot where he has remained since January. Thomas averages 34 minutes of play time and 29 points with a plus/minus of three

John Wall comes in at sixth on the MVP ladder. Wall is a guard for the Washington Wizards and has moved up from the 10th spot since week 11 began. He has an average play time of 36 minutes and scores 22 points with 10 assists per game. He has a dou-

ble-double average with a plus/minus of four.

Two-time MVP Stephen Curry is currently sitting in seventh place where he has fluctuated since week 11. Curry is a guard for the Golden State Warriors with a plus/minus contribution of six. He averages 24 points and 33 minutes of play time each game in the regular season.

The last three athletes in the top 10 have moved up since January.

They were either in the top 15 or not ranked at all.

The eighth player on the ladder is Gordon Hayward, forward for Utah Jazz. He averages 34 minutes of play time with 22 points per game. He has a plus/ minus contribution of four.

Paul George is the ninth spot on the MVP ladder. He is a forward for the Indiana Pacers with an average play time of 35 minutes. He scores 22 points per game on average.



Rounding out the top 10 is Mike Conley, guard for the Memphis Grizzlies. His average play time is 33 minutes with 20 points per game.

The next five players are still in the running but not ranked in the top 10: Giannis Antetokounmpo (Milwaukee Bucks,) Jimmy Butler (Chicago Bulls.) DeMar DeRozan (Toronto Raptors,) Marc Gasol (Memphis Grizzlies) and Chris Paul (Los Angeles Clippers.)

Kevin Durant (Golden State

Warriors) and Kyle Lowry (Toronto Raptors) have been removed from the MVP ladder due to long-term injuries.



> big wins. Head coach Steve Dintaman explains that there have been some major contributors on the team despite being plagued with injuries.

"We are banged up a little bit on the pitching side, but the guys we do have are doing an outstanding job of having guys throw strikes and be able to compete in the zone," Dintaman said.

According to Dintaman, the team's biggest

reason for success in past games has been their offense.

"We took two out of three [three weekends ago] against Kellogg but the biggest thing that helped us was our offense," Dintaman said.

This includes Brandon Hanson, who is one of the leaders on the team in batting average and quality at-bats. Azim Qadri had a big game last weekend against Tiffin, where he hit for the cycle (single, double, triple and home run in the same game) to go along with two doubles and a grand slam. Sean Darmafall was named Conference Player of the Week three weeks ago.

"So [the production] is coming from a lot of guys, but primarily those three guys as far as production goes," Dintaman said.

He said that they usually try to play four games in three days on the weekend. In addition, they have scrimmages every Wednesday so that the players on the bench get some action.

"We are just practicing while staying fit to make sure that we are ready for games and preparing every week," Dintaman said.

He hopes that the weather will get better as the season goes on.

"Hopefully this is the last week that we will deal with cold weather and we will get decent temperatures here," Dintaman said.

In addition to playing baseball, the players are also expected to do well in academics.

In order to be able to compete college baseball, players are asked to maintain at least a 2.0 GPA.

Dintaman's own standards are for the players to maintain a 2.5 GPA and attend class regularly.

'We have to understand our roles and make sure we are there and if we are not there. then we are going to pay the

price," Dintaman said. The fans are a big ele-

ment that has added to the atmosphere for the baseball team. Dintaman explains that Grady Field is a great place to watch baseball for all ages.

"Kids can come onto the field between games and hang out with our guys. With our guys, you can give them a high-five, ask them for an autograph. This is very family oriented," Dintaman said.

The Tartan Pride is currently ranked 11 after jumping four spots in the NJCAA Division II baseball poll.

They are currently the only team in Region 12 that has a Top 20 ranking.

They have had 112 runs over 13 games and pulled out seven home runs that includes a Grand Slam.

Tartan Pride faced Mercyhurst North East in a double header last weekend. This week they will play Vincennes University and then Edison Community College over the weekend.

offensive weapon. Masood spent two years in prison for an attack with a knife. Metropolitan Police Acting Deputy Commissioner day before the anniversary of the Brussels bombings. Belgian police intercepted a vehicle speeding without any indication of stopping before it could reach a busy supermarket area.



Mark Rowley said "two further significant arrests" while "massive amounts of computer data" and general items have been seized.

World leaders responded to the incident in solidarity with the U.K. German Chancellor, Angela Merkel "He was looking to kill people and to cause something dramatic," said Hollande.

ISIS claimed responsibility for the London attack, hailing Masood as a "soldier of the Islamic State."



said that "in the fight against any form of terrorism we firmly and decidedly stand by Great Britain." President of France, Fran-

cois Hollande, said that "terrorism concerns us all and France knows how the British people are suffering today." The comments come after several French school children were injured during the attack.

This is the first major terror attack in London since 2005's London suicide bombings on public transport systems.

The attack occurred one

A pro-European Union march was still held in the wake of these events in London. Westminster is remaining under tight security for the time being while police continue to probe into the case.

On March 23, there was a candlelight vigil at Trafalgar Square. Home Secretary Amber Rudd spoke to the crowd. "Terrorism will not defeat us."

A history of 'systematic problems'

Trust continued from front issue is still very current and prevalent.

Dayton Police Commissioner Joey Williams encouraged African Americans to put the history of police violence behind them and encourage young people to join the police.

"At some point we have to let that go and encourage our young people to join because you can't make change unless you're in the room," Williams said.

According to Callais, one of the largest problems police officers still face is that some are still trying the policy of containment.

"We still continue to see disproportionate policing in black, low income neighborhoods," he said. "Primarily we still the active practice of policing being a containment strategy. What we mean by that is essentially just trying to get people to not exit that neighborhood.

"If there's problem at all, if there's violence at all, [police] try to keep it in that neighborhood, so it doesn't spill out. Where on other neighborhoods they try to focus more on protection."

One member in a five person panel, Wright State Psychology professor Steven Kniffley, noted that many young children are taught to fear the police when parents use statements such as "If you don't behave, the police are going to come and arrest you."

"Kids [make] associations around the age of six years old. Those are pretty much solidified unless there's an intentional effort made to change. So, while it's good to [reach out] to these high school kids, but we're really trying to make a difference with these folks and change their opinions, we have to start engaging with those who are six years old," he said.

According to Callais, the history of police violence doesn't mean that police need to evaporate all together, it just needs systematic changes.

"The research shows that we need police," Callais said. "This isn't supposed to imply that we don't. What it means though is that you start to get to a point where you get diminishing return. Where it starts to focus more on strategy and technique as opposed to just a couple of extra police officers out there." According to Callais, introducing changes to police procedures is difficult for them to adjust to, just like it would be in any other job.

Some audience members felt frustration over policing in their own community and tried to put a voice to it.

"This gentleman [Callais] just sat and gave an

incredible historical perspective on the structural problems of the police and

when asked questions by the staff you didn't talk about how those structural problems affect Dayton specifically," one ecuted of p woman said.

"He said there were structural problems [with police] in the black community and nobody talks about that. What are the problems facing Dayton with respect to police? Black men don't become officers because by the time they're 25, they've been stopped 25 times by the police. Stop and frisk may be unconstitutional but it's happening daily... it's a systemically racist institution and we need to deal with that."

Others implored audience members to educate children and hold conversations about what's on the news with them. He also encouraged people to attend ride alongs.

"There are these opportunities. Nationally, we're very very low on the scale of how our police and community interact... We need to educate children, talk to them about things we're seeing on the news even if we disagree with it. Watch television with your child, help them understand why the media has that perspective," one man stated.

Callais noted in Department of Justice's report on the Ferguson Police Department that officers issued a high number of citations in black communities, targeting them three times more than white civilians. Those citations, according to Callais, opened the door to unlawful raids, targeting of communities and, eventually, police shootings.

He also cited new technology and smart phones for a large rise in protests in police shootings. "We increase focus on this

Callais said that online communication can be a downfall for younger generations and the information they receive.

"But it can also be a group that is so locked into the kind of the simplicity of online communication. It's not an issue that can be explained through meme culture. So the people who embrace that, I would say tend to be a bit more problematic."

Callais stated that younger people can be very open to new ideas and learning about things that they might not have before.

"To the general issue, I think that younger people are some of the most open and some of least open people I've ever encountered in terms of this particular issue. There are many people who are willing to accept that they may not know as much as they think about the particular issue and listen more," he said.

Callais gave the reminder that police are human, just under a different kind of microscope.

"Police are human. Surprise. So, police are human, they're affected by regulations, they're threatened by changes. They don't want to be looked at constantly and managed. The problem is they have a unique authority and that's why we focus on it a bit more."







Sudoku Puzzle

The objective of the game is to fill all the blank squares in a game with the correct numbers. There are three very simple constraints to follow. In a 9 by 9 square Sudoku game:

- Every row of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order.
- Every column of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order.
- Every 3 by 3 subsection of the 9 by 9 square must include all digits 1 through 9. Every Sudoku game begins

with some squares already filled in, and the difficulty of each game is due to how many squares are filled in. The more squares that are known, the easier it is to figure out which numbers go in the open squares. As you fill in squares

correctly, options for the remaining squares are narrowed and it becomes easier to fill them in.



Sudoku Tips: Start by looking for numbers that occur frequently in the initial puzzle. For example, say you have a lot of 5's in the initial puzzle. Look for the 3x3 box where there is no 5. Look for 5's in other rows and columns that can help you eliminate where the 5 might go in tht box. If there is a 5 in columns 1 and 2, then there can't be a 5 anywhere else in either of those columns. You know then that whatever leftmost 3x3 box that is missing a 5 must have it go in column 3. If you can eliminate all the possibilities in that box except for 1 square, you've got it down!
