The obsession for social media has created a new format for communication and human relationships, but has technology gone so far as to kill romance?

Counseling psychologist, Sally O'Reilly said some people "see technology as an unwanted third person in the relationship. If one partner is constantly on Facebook, this might be interpreted as a preference for Facebook friends over the real life relationship. If our partner is beside us feeling ignored, we have a problem."

Romance and dating have seen their simple times, and all though it would be nice to receive a love letter or a phone call, instead of a "Netflix and chill" text, technology isn't slowing down for us anytime soon.

Now, with the overload of dating sites and social media,

## Will Woosh woo or woe?

Woosh, a sustainable water company selected Sinclair as a main portion of their market testing in the Greater Dayton area. The Dayton Region Israel Trade Alliance played a key role in the process of bringing Woosh's business to Dayton.

Launched February 1 outside the Main Street Café in Building 10, President of Sinclair Steve Johnson was there along with Montgomery County City Commissioner Dan Foley, Dayton City Commissioner Chris Shaw, head of the Dayton Development Coalition Julie Sullivan, and Co-Founder and CEO Itay Tayas Zamir to kick off the opening of the Smart Stations.

Woosh's market testing features three Smart Water Stations around campus available for students to purchase filtered water

at fractions of the price of competitive bottled water brands. There are a select and limited amount of stations outside of the Sinclair locations.

The Smart Stations—created with cloud technology—feature regular refills for average containers up to 600 ml at the price of \$.50, and refills for larger containers, up to 1000 ml at \$.75. Additionally, Woosh offers a unique rinse service for a surcharge of \$.15.

"Really, what we did was build a relationship, and really—that's what this Israel and Dayton initiative is all about," Foley said.

There is potential for Dayton to later produce the Woosh machines, according to Foley.

"We believe that with our manufacturing companies and with our workforce, we can make these machines in Dayton, Ohio. So, our partnership with Itay

# Iowa caucus: a coin toss

Coin tosses, record breaking, shocking results, and misleading polls — it was caucus night in Iowa. The amount of votes that the top three Republican candidates received was the highest it has ever been on Tuesday night. Ted Cruz was declared the winner for the Republicans, which contradicted the polls and placed Donald Trump in second. Marco Rubio placed a strong third, which shocked many. A coin toss is what allegedly determined the Democrat's winner, who was Hillary Clinton.

"No one remembers who came in second," Donald Trump quoted on Twitter on December 30. Trump, the self-proclaimed "winner," changed his tone to humility after the loss. He said that he was "honored" to be in second and that he is very happy with the results. However, his Twitter

began telling a different story when he accused Ted Cruz of committing fraud and Trump called for a new caucus. Trump said on Twitter after his second place finish, "During Prime Time of the Iowa Caucus, Cruz put out a release that Ben Carson was quitting the race, and to caucus (or vote) for Cruz."

The Democratic side was too close to call for much of the night and both Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders claimed victory. However, it was Clinton who scraped a win with two more delegates than Sanders, leaving Senator Sanders to admit defeat.

Despite the loss, this is actually a big win for Bernie, who was expected to perform poorly in the caucuses. He came within .3 percentage points of Hillary and proved that he is a real contender for the nomination. This was also a win for Clinton, who won a state that is tailored towards Bernie Sanders. Sanders performs best among white people

and also in college towns, which Iowa has plenty of. Clinton proved that she can perform well in states that are not her strong suit.

Clinton was hoping to receive a resounding win in order to put off the memories of her loss to Barack Obama in 2008. Her small win is causing both supporters and critics to question whether she can actually receive the presidential nomination. Clinton's near loss comes too close to the time when an unsuspecting candidate came from behind. Bernie Sanders is coming very close to her in this race and she will have to work even harder for the votes.

Clinton's little victory is highly controversial because a coin toss determined her win. Iowa does break ties with a coin toss and many people are now demanding an inquiry into caucus voting methods. There is no official record of the coin tosses, so people are unclear how many each candidate won. However, the final dele-

company in a way he want it to for success, not only for Itay but for the Dayton region," Foley said.

Dayton has access to the Great Miami aquifer, which fueled the "Save the Tap" campaign in which Dayton residents are encouraged to cut back on bottled water purchases and to instead enjoy Dayton's high quality tap water in an effort to be both sustainable and cost efficient.

The Woosh Smart Water Stations track the estimated amount of bottles saved from landfills through Woosh use.

"These two communities from across the globe have found a way to partner and bring new economic opportunities to Dayton," Sullivan said.

Itay was the last to take the stand. Sinclair's vibrant campus, student body and faculty made the partnership seem like "heaven," according to Itay. "It was clear that Sinclair was the ideal location," Itay said.

Sinclair students have noticed the installations, and throughout the week of the launch. Woosh workers have been at locations with free samples to promote interest.

"I actually plan on using it," Alexander Abbot, Communication major said. "Everything seems logical about it. I happen to use a lot of bottled water and it's usually pretty pricey and the bottles build up," Abbot said.

The green initiative seems to be attracting positive reception on

campus. However, the economic incentive is also turning people towards Woosh. "Basically it's 60 cents for filtered water. I think I'm [interested] because it's a hell of a lot cheaper than a \$1.50 bottled water," Kairsten Boninsegna, ASL major said.

Some students aren't quite sold on the water stations. "The girl's lockerroom in Building 8 already has a water bottle refilling station," Yazil Palmer said.

Sinclair has dozens of water fountains across its massive campus, will Woosh catch on? Is being green and saving green enough? Tell us what you think online.

The Woosh Smart Water Stations are located in the Tartan Marketplace in Building 7, Main Street Café in Building 10 and Building 14 near the tunnel to the parking lot.

## Sinclair builds on Health Science Program

Health Sciences was recently granted a 31.5 million dollar budget to renovate and expand Building 14 so the Health Sciences could collaborate and work in one place. The learning community pitched its idea to the Board of Trustees in December.

The design and move plan will allow the students to not only work together but also understand how each position operates in real world situations and what the responsibilities of each position are in these given situations.

"It's very important in order to have success that the practitioners all know each other's responsibilities and know how to work together," Dean of Health Sciences Rena Shuchat said.

This collaborative learning is the way all health care education is headed. Like Shuchat said, this allows for success and lets the practitioners be as effective and efficient as possible.

While a majority of the programs will be moving to the new facility, two departments, vet tech and clinical lab tech will stay where they currently reside. According to

"It's a really exciting time because one of the major focuses is going to be interdisciplinary instruction," Assistant Health Sciences Dean Jan-

ice Mains said. The move is also a part of the college's plan to be more aligned with the community. The new building will house a new rehab clinic and dental clinic that will take patients from the community. This will give the dental clinic more chairs to accommodate more patients. In addition the clinic will be on the first floor and parking will be adjacent making it easier for patients to get to the clinic.

"It's a benefit to us to know what each one of us is doing," Professor and Chairperson of Dental Health Sciences Sue Raffee said.

The move and update will open new doors for students. Simulation will be a big part of this advancement. Simulation allows students to get the experience they need without

risk or compromising the health of an actual patient. "Simulation provides low risk experience for high risk results," Mains said.

Currently the health sciences division has 41 degree and certificate programs and plans to expand in the coming years. Raffee has been at Sinclair since 1980 and says she believes this will be the biggest advancement she has seen at Sinclair for the health sciences division.

The building is planned to be up and running by the fall semester of 2017.

Most of the candidates are now spending their time in New Hampshire hoping to woo the voters in the state. Some, such as Ted Cruz, are also focusing their attention in South Carolina as well.

Ohio Governor John Kasich is polling at 11.5 percent in New Hampshire and is expected to perform well in the state. This could be a big turning point for him in the campaign. Marco Rubio is continuing his upward climb by going on to New Hampshire, however he is facing criticism from Governor Christie, former Governor Bush, and Kasich for not spending more time in New Hampshire. For Jeb Bush, this is his chance to show that he is a good candidate, especially after his poor showing in Iowa.

On the Democratic side, Bernie Sanders is leading Hillary Clinton by 23 points in New Hampshire and is likely to put in a

With Lansing losing previously in the week, a number one ranked Sinclair team seemed very possible with just two games in their way, both of which they have beaten before. After handling Columbus state, the Tartan's suffered their first loss after losing 79-73 to Lakeland Community College. The Pride had just beaten them in December 88-66.

The Pride were up by as much as 21 within ten minutes into the first half, but let the lead slip away. A combination of late turnovers and missed shots plagued them as Lakeland make a huge 16-1 run late to hand the Tartans their first loss. Some could say it was bound to happen, but that's not the mentality Coach Price had.

"As a competitor, you never want to lose. We lost our own accord because we didn't shoot the ball very well. We only shot 27 percent in the second half. We kind of

After New Hampshire, the South Carolina Caucus and the Nevada Caucus is next. Ohio's primary will be held on March 15 and the deadline to register to vote is February 16. Candidates may not devote as much time to Ohio as they have in the past due to Governor Kasich's strong presence in our state.

The candidates have a long road to the White House ahead of them and it is only just beginning.

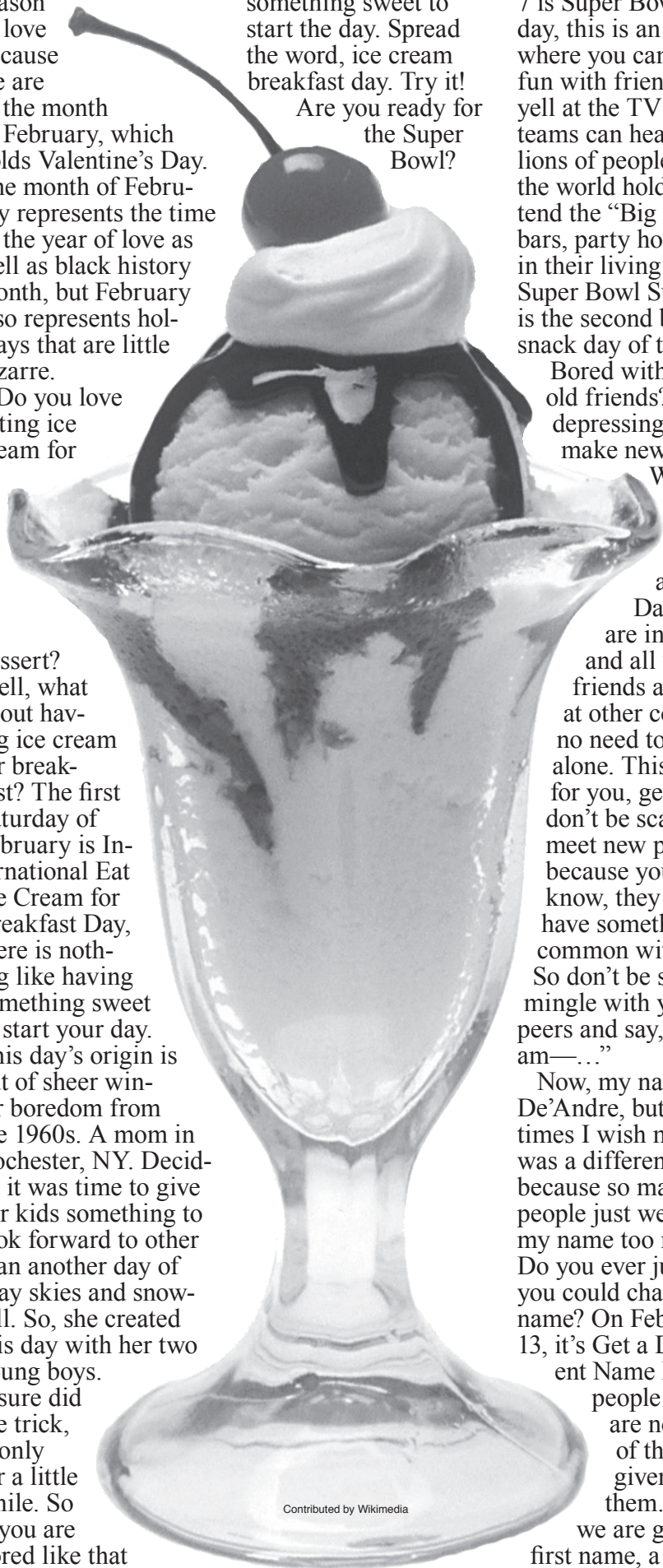

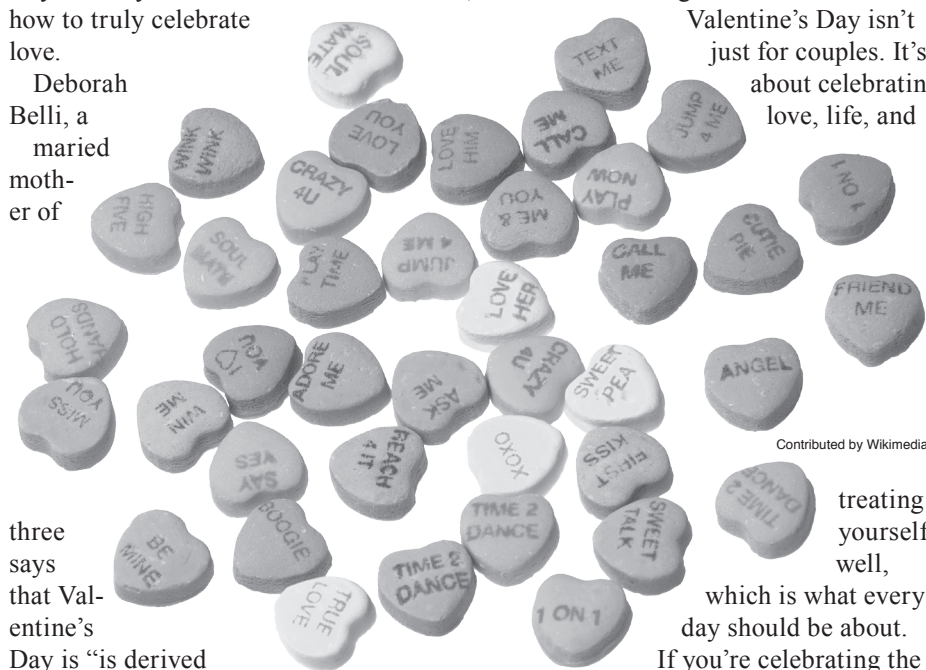
Valentine's Day isn't just for couples. It's about celebrating love, life, and

people can increase their dating choices, but the downside is that based on what you put out on the internet, the potential partners may be judging you off of superficial information.

"There's not a dating service on this planet that can do what the human brain can do in terms of finding the right person," Anthropologist, Helen Fisher said.

In Aziz Ansari's book, *Modern Romance*, he talks about how stressful crafting the perfect text is and how it causes him angst—how long do you wait till you reply? What do you say back so that it doesn't look like you're too desperate, but you still want to go on a date? Are you being too forward or not forward enough?

"The key is to get off the screen and meet these people. Don't spend your nights in endless exchanges with strangers," Ansari

writes.

Although there are endless options on how to communicate, Ansari said that society shouldn't forget there are human beings behind the social media and smartphones.

Technology and the digital age have created new challenges of trust and dishonesty in relationships. According to Ansari's book, roughly 84 percent of Americans feel that adultery is morally wrong, however approximately 24 percent have been involved in affairs, possibly tempted by social networking.

According to USA Today, approximately 31 percent of men and 33 percent of woman agree that asking for a date via text message is less intimidating than a phone call, and 44 percent of men said it's easier to flirt and get acquainted through social media or texting rather than face-to-face.

Professor at Califor-

nia State University and clinical psychologist, Beverly Palmer, said that relationships could end prematurely because texting doesn't have the same level of intimacy that someone's voice has.

Ruthie Dean, author of *Real Men Don't Text*, said the millennial generation—born 1982 to 2000—experience a lack of communication because they have their heads down in their smartphones rather than experiencing life and relationships.

"We don't know how to express our emotions, and we tend to hide behind technology, computers and social media," Dean said.

Research in 2014, conducted by Princeton Survey Research Associates found that 42 percent of 18-to-29-year-olds said their significant other had been distracted by their phones and 18 percent of them had argued over the amount of time that they spent on social media.

Psychiatrist, Dr. Ed-

ward Hallowell said the use of social media and texting alienates each other, and before you know it, you've been establishing a greater relationship with your phone instead of your partner.

"You really do need time and attention in order to feel empathy, in order to feel trust in order to feel closeness. Particularly busy working couples don't know how to turn it off," Hallowell said.

Steinnorth said couples don't receive alone time anymore. "All the time and energy that goes into maintain a lot of social media can take away from the one-on-one time couples share."

Don't let facebook define your relationship. Psychology Today said that the more anxious or fearful a person is, the

more time they will spend monitoring their partners social media posts and usage—this results in jealousy and insecurity.

"Culture and technology have always shaken romance, but history shows that we've continually adapted to these changes. No matter the obstacle, we keep finding love and romance," Ansari writes.

# Sinclair presents: 'As it is in Heaven'

The cast and crew of the Sinclair Theatre Department's newest production "As it is in Heaven" truly went further to get into character. Translating a piece from one of American society's most fervent early religious groups—the Shakers.

Sinclair's Black Box Theatre presents "As it is in Heaven" February 12 through February 20. The play, originally written on stage in 2002, was written after Arlene Hutton visited the restored Shaker Village in Harrodsburg, Kentucky. Just like Hutton, the production cast made their way to Pleasant Hills to connect better with their performance.

Unlike some Theatre Department productions, "As it is in Heaven" features a cast entirely comprised of Sinclair students. Whereas "The Wiz" featured a community cast, partnering with Dayton talent, "As it is in Heaven" is sure to be a unique experience full of student talent.

This isn't the only thing that separates the production apart from the others this theatre season. The entirety of the play will be a capella. Although a capella performances may seem extra nerve-wracking, the cast has dedicated week after week of rehearsal under Show Director and Sinclair Assistant Professor of Theatre and Dance Kimberly Borst.

The cast is also exclusively female,



numbering just seven actresses.

The cast and crew got an inside look of the "utopian" society during their trip.

The premise of the play is the society's response to the arrival of Fanny, a woman who claims she can see angels. Fanny, a newcomer, pulls at the fabric of the Shaker society—one that is reliant on remaining the same.

Set in the 1830s, As it is in Heaven features a strong selection of songs and Shaker hymns, one of which the title is taken from, "The Saviour's Universal Prayer (Our Farther Who Art in Heaven)."

What will happen to a society that functions off routine as it conflicts with a Shaker newcomer caught in between her desire to be a true Shaker and to satisfy her curiosity in the supernatural? The compelling story and emotional character portrayal will keep you on your toes as the Shakers' story unfolds.

The acting talent wasn't the only part of the production

to benefit from the trip to Kentucky. Set design directly from the restored Shaker village was incorporated into the stage.

Gina Fidler, Assistant Set Designer, made the benches. Modeled through the Shaker philosophy of simple and functional, the entire bench is composed of fewer than ten pieces. With wooden rods glued in place for a simple construction, the benches are fully functional and supportive without the use of screws.

General admission will run \$15, but by taking advantage of Throwback Thursday students can save \$5 on tickets. The Sunday, February 14 showing as well as the Thursday, February 18 showing will be ASL interpreted.

"Shakers," meaning believers, still exist in just two locations: Canterbury, New Hampshire and Sabbath Lake, Maine. Ohio was one of the states that contained a sizable Shaker

community during the height of Shakerism in the mid 1800s.

Although Shakerism as a whole is founded on similar principles to Christianity, there are several interesting departures. One of which is an active force in the play, the supernatural belief of communicating with spirits and even having visions. After all, the Shakers got their name from being called the "shaking Quakers."

Shakerism

eventually declined due to the society's emphasis on celibacy, resulting in no new Shakers from the population of the villages. Relying on outsiders signing the covenant, which includes relinquishing all property to the community upon signing, was not a popular decision for many.

However, because of this policy and other core ideals of Shakerism, the Shakers are remembered for their compassionate

welcoming of anyone to their societies. Shakers often took in orphans and others persecuted or mistreated by society. Fanny is one such newcomer in the play, finding her place within society and the supernatural.

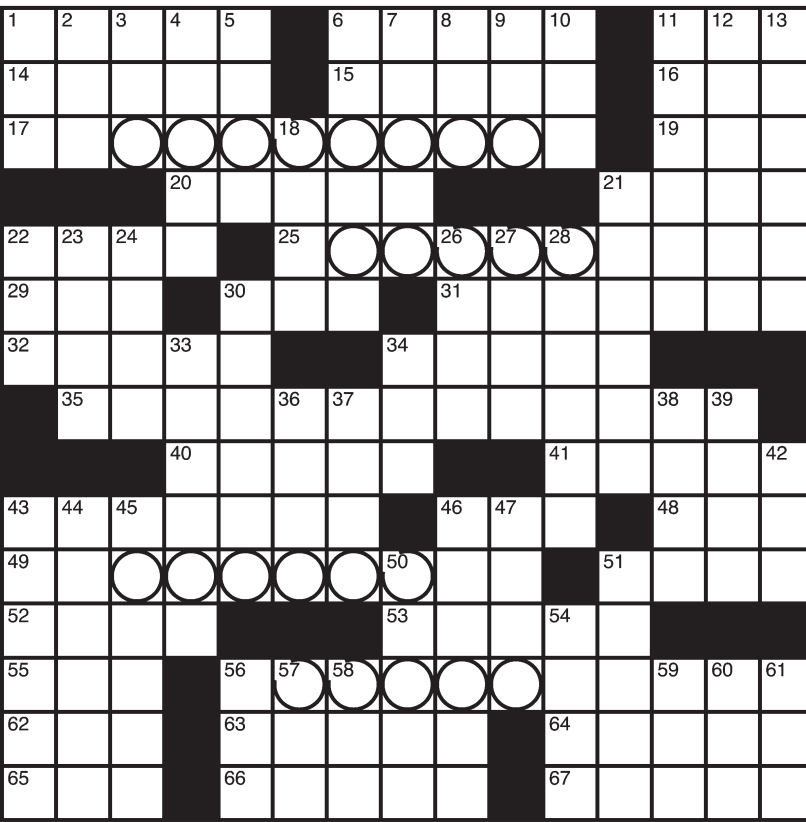

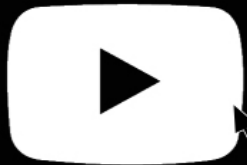

### SUDOKU PUZZLE

The objective of the game is to fill all the blank squares in a game with the correct numbers. There are three very simple constraints to follow. In a 9 by 9 square Sudoku game:

- Every row of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order.
- Every column of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order.
- Every 3 by 3 subsection of the 9 by 9 square must include all digits 1 through 9.

Every Sudoku game begins with some squares already filled in, and the difficulty of each game is due to how many squares are filled in. The more squares that are known, the easier it is to figure out which numbers go in the open squares. As you fill in squares

correctly, options for the remaining squares are narrowed and it becomes easier to fill them in.

**Sudoku Tips:** Start by looking for numbers that occur frequently in the initial puzzle. For example, say you have a lot of 5's in the initial puzzle. Look for the 3x3 box where there is no 5. Look for 5's in other rows and columns that can help you eliminate where the 5 might go in the box. If there is a 5 in columns 1 and 2, then there can't be a 5 anywhere else in either of those columns. You know then that whatever leftmost 3x3 box that is missing a 5 must have it go in column 3. If you can eliminate all the possibilities in that box except for 1 square, you've got it down!

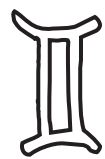

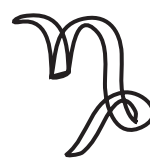
