Save the date

The Earth's friction is no laughing matter, according to NASA officials at a press conference March 28 at the James Webb Auditorium at NASA Headquarters in Washington. The event was broadcast throughout 31 countries, the latest number of viewers reaching just under 40 million—about the same as the number of US citizens who watched President Obama's inauguration.

This year was a leap year, created to keep the Gregorian calendar accurate. Next year, however, NASA detailed will consist of 367 days. "The Earth's rotation is slowing," Dr. Ellena Stophan, Chief Scientist of NASA said. "Tidal forces create

friction with stray space particles in Earth's orbit, gradually lagging our spin."

"It is foreseeable, in the not-so-distant future, that our 24 hour day will become 25," Stophan said. Stophan elaborated that the combination of the Moon's continual drifting from its orbit and the Milankovitch Cycle's eccentricity in precession has resulted in a necessary departure from our calendar.

"Time-keeping is central to the function of our societies in an increasingly connected, global community. To maintain the trust that we keep in time, we will have to make a necessary departure. To be in the right place, you have to be at the right time. Therefore, April

The Student and Community Engagement Office offers help with building an effective resume, information on appropriate dress, and how to effectively conduct oneself in a job interview. The staff will conduct mock job interviews with students to help recognize strengths and correct weaknesses before the student makes a mistake in front of a potential employer.

Students can make a one-on-one appointment with staff members at the office where they will go over the student's resume and make any necessary changes. This can help students recognize their strengths and weaknesses and work on them. On March 31, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., there will be an open resume review. Students can go to the Tartan Marketplace with no appointment to have a staff member review their resume.

Matt Massie, manager of the Student and Community Engagement Office, explained that Career Fairs are a fantastic opportunity for students. "Why wouldn't you [come]?" he laughed. Massie said Career Fairs

are an extremely efficient way to visit multiple employers at once.

Ask them about their company and show interest in what they do. As you leave each employer, learn what happens next and what, if anything, you should do to advance your candidacy. Be sure to THANK THEM for their time and interest.

Do Not Expect Job Offers.

Simply gather as much information as possible. Use this opportunity to learn from these representatives. This is an excellent opportunity to explore companies and help determine which work setting fits your needs.

Follow up, Follow up, Follow up.

Follow up on any conversation with a representative that was of interest with a letter or thank-you card. Express appreciation for the time given. Mention why you want to work for the organization, and ask for an interview. Give a phone number where one can be reached, ideally, day and evening.

Trump, Clinton: bad for GOP?

We are over halfway through the 2016 primary election season and it is becoming ever clearer who it will be squaring off for the presidency of the United States this November. It is likely that the Democratic Party will nominate former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, despite a tough challenge from Senator Bernie Sanders of Vermont, and it is likely that the Republican Party will nominate billionaire businessman Donald Trump of New York, who has been at the top of the leaderboards in the GOP race virtually the entire time he has been a candidate.

Why do I say this? Well, let's first take a look at the raw numbers in both primaries.

On the Republican side, the delegate count looks like this: Donald Trump has 739 pledged delegates to his name. Senator Ted Cruz of Texas has 465 delegates, Florida Senator Marco Rubio (who has already dropped out) has 166, Ohio Governor John Kasich has 143, and 15 have gone to candidates that have already dropped out.

To win, one of the three remaining Republicans must attain 1,237 delegates to win the nomination, and there are 944 delegates remaining in the states left to vote. According to the del-

egate math, it is impossible for Gov. Kasich to win the nomination. He needs 1,094 delegates, or 120 percent of the remaining delegates, to win, and because of that many Republicans are calling on Gov. Kasich to leave the race and make it a two-man affair between Mr. Trump and Sen. Cruz. Mr. Trump needs 498 delegates, or 53 percent of the remaining delegates, to win the nomination. Sen. Cruz needs 772 delegates, or 82 percent of the remaining delegates, to win.

Just by this math alone, it would appear that Mr. Trump is in a much stronger position to win the Republican nomination and he is leading in many upcoming states such as Arizona and is expected to run strong in states like New York. Mr. Trump also seems to be winning in states that have open primaries – states where the Republican Party of the state allow independents and even some Democrats to vote in a Republican primary. In states that have closed primaries – states that allow only a specific party's registered members to vote – Sen. Cruz is winning those states and that is what is somehow keeping him in the race.

For the Democrats, it is much different with the addition of their "superdelegates"- party leaders who can vote for whom they please and can switch

their votes when they please. Of pledged delegates, Hillary Clinton has amassed 1,223 and Bernie Sanders has amassed 920. Of superdelegates, Secretary Clinton has earned 467 and Sen. Sanders has earned only 26. Combined, Secretary Clinton has 1,690 to Sen. Sanders' 946.

To win, one of the two Demo-

crats must attain a total of 2,383 delegates and there are 2,129 delegates remaining in the states still to vote. Secretary Clinton needs 693 delegates, or roughly a third of the remaining delegates to win. Sen. Sanders meanwhile needs 1,437 delegates, or roughly two-thirds of the remaining delegates to win. Much like Mr. Trump on the Republican side, Secretary Clinton leads in a large chunk of the remaining

primary states, but Sen. Sanders seems to be doing best in caucus states – states where mass meetings are held in polling places and the caucus-goers argue and debate over who is the best candidate are and they are polled as such. But even still it seems to be an uphill battle for Sen. Sanders and as much as his

those numbers if Mr. Trump is the nominee. That same poll also matched Sen. Sanders (should he win) against Mr. Trump and the numbers get worse: Sen. Sanders defeats Mr. Trump by 20 points. But on that same note, the same poll also factored in Sen. Cruz and Gov. Kasich in hypothetical matchups. Between Sen. Cruz and Secretary Clinton, they are neck-and-neck. But, Sen. Cruz loses by double-digits (13 points, to be precise) to Sen. Sanders. Gov. Kasich fares a bit better, losing to Sen. Sanders by 6 points. But when it comes to him and Secretary Clinton, Gov. Kasich actually BEATS her by 6 points.

From these numbers, if Mr. Trump does win the Republican nomination, he will lose and lose royally. So, I would think some Republicans are hoping and praying that their convention in Cleveland does end up being a contested convention, one where one candidate does not have a majority of delegate support and the delegates argue amongst each other who the nominee is. And if Republicans really care about winning, they may want to try and coalesce around Sen. Cruz in the remaining states or, if a contested convention happens, look to a dark-horse (or unexpected candidate, which has happened before) like Gov. Kasich.

Continued from front first, 2017, will be known as International Save the Date Day," Stofan said. Like daylight saving time, where the clocks are set back or forth an hour to make use of sunlight in society, the additional day, which would usually be April 1, will make up for the .0006 eventual eccentricity of axial tilt, resulting in an overabundance of leap seconds as time continues over the entire lifespan of the solar system.

The Milankovitch Cycle, relating to the Earth's obliquity, eccentricity and precession explains that these forces are not constant. Over the years, these changes have happened and could continue to happen, according to NASA. "We understand the difficulty businesses and the people of the world will have to burden with the addition of International Save the Date Day, but by doing so—even just this once—the Gregorian calendar can remain our trusted method of time-keeping for the

remainder of all civilization," Stophan said to crowds. Most payroll companies will pay on International Save the Date Day, but if payments are due by contract, the payments will not be late until the end of the following day, April 1. International Save the Date Day will be the first one-time government holiday honored in the United States. The calendar will then continue as usual. April holidays, like National Ferret Day on April 2, National Chocolate Mousse Day on April 3, National Hug a Newsperson Day (The Clarion is located in Building 8, Room 027) and of course the observation of Autism Awareness Month, Arab-American Month, Earth Month and many more will continue as usual. What date will be put on the birth certificates of children born on International Save the Date Day has yet to be decided.

Gem City Comic Con

As a result of the success of popular movies like “Guardians of the Galaxy,” “Deadpool,” and more recently “Superman vs. Batman” geek culture and comics have continued to blend their way into the new mainstream of the entertainment industry--and with it, the growth of local comic and pop culture conventions.

Gem City Comic Con is April 2 and 3 at the Dayton Convention Center promoting art and reading by introducing all ages to the world of sequential art.

“There’s so few conventions in Dayton—especially one that has grown this big and stayed with us—we need show them some love,” Kate Isaacs, pan-

elist at Gem City Comic Con, said.

Jesse Noble, promoter of Gem City Comic Con, said he had always had a strong connection with comics and had always collected them as a child. Later, Noble had to part with his collection to finance a guitar when he was younger. Fifteen years later, Noble found someone selling his or her collection and decided to rebuild his comic collection.

“As it turned out, there were a lot more comics than I needed. So I got a table at a little show in Columbus and sold some comics,” Noble said. “It was really fun, so I traveled to Detroit, and Pittsburgh and Chicago, selling comics meeting people.”

After traveling from show to show, he had an idea about bringing a

convention to the Gem City.

“Eleven years, and three venues, here we are,” Noble said.

According to gemcitycomiccon.com, the convention is full of passion for art, fiction and comic books and hopes to share the enthusiasm of comics with the community.

“It’s a good way to find out about up-and-coming creators whose work you might not have discovered otherwise because they are so new to the game,” Isaacs said. “It’s really to support the fact that it’s in Dayton.”

Isaacs and many others will be hosting their own panels. The panels range from informative to interactive, containing a diverse range of subjects from comics and more, all from the

perspective of industry guests with real experience in the field and attendee-guests with their own content.

“[My presentation] is going to be mini comics, so I am going to have a powerpoint explaining what they are. I will have a little example that everyone will get for free and then I will have a pre-made [comic] that people can fill out and make themselves,” Isaacs said.

Along with the panels, there will also be events, such as a costume contest and a “Heroes Initiative” live auction.

The Heroes Initiative functions as a financial safety-net for comic creators. The nonprofit has helped over 50 comic book veterans since its realization, granting over \$700,000.

The Heroes Initiative is an important charity to Jesse, according to Isaacs because a lot of independent comic

creators have to fund themselves, so the money donated from the auction goes to a creator in need each year to help with expenses.

“It’s a way for the community to help each other,” Isaacs said.

Tickets are \$8 per day

or \$15 for the weekend. Children under 12 get in free with the purchase of one adult ticket.

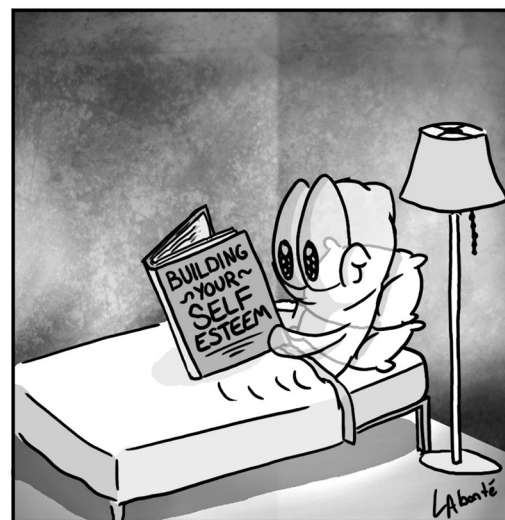

Carmicheal and Silvestri—those are big pieces in our lineup,” said Dintaman. “We were picked off two or three times this weekend. We’re just giving away outs in the base path, which is something we have not done before. We have to sharpen those things up.”

On a more positive note, freshman Nick Massey has proved to be an offensive force and has earned his role in the starting lineup from here on out. He is batting an impressive .415 and an on base percentage of .500, meaning he is getting on base every other at bat. He had three home runs in one game against

Muskegon and has gotten a hit in 15 of the 17 games played this season. When offensive guys like Jimmy White move on to a four year college, someone has to step up to fill those shoes and Massey has done that so far.

“It is kind of one of those things that you expected. He’s a pretty confident kid—he has prepared well. He’s worked extremely hard to earn the right to be in the lineup every day. He had those opportunities and he has made the most of them. In your first year to have that good start, it does help guys settle down,” said Dintaman.

With only two losses in the books, and both of those defeats being by one run, one could think that those two were just flukes and can’t really take away much from it. Not only has Dintaman learned from those two games, but recently the team hasn’t been playing up to the standard of his liking.

“There’s been a couple games, especially here recently, that we

have not played very well. We discussed that as if it was a loss. I told our guys, talking about Skip Bertman, the old LSU coach, four things can happen during a game: you play well and you can win, you play bad and you can win, you can win and play bad or you can lose and play bad,” said Dintaman.

Sometimes a team has some kind of inspirational story of a sick

player or something to spark the team to do well. The Tartan Pride use DJ Khaled to get them going. DJ Khaled has become the team’s motivation.

“DJ Khaled is a major, major key—my guys love him, my guys quote him, my guys talk about him. It’s a lingo we use a lot in

program. We have this board before our first game and it’s like 28 practices until our opener. We come up with all these things to do to make sure we are 100 percent prepared and DJ Khaled made the list. Someone put [him] up on the board. We had to make sure we were focused on DJ Khaled before the season started,” said Dintaman.

Though Dintaman does not follow him on snapchat, he does check up on his Twitter and watch some vines.

“Another one,” said Dintaman.

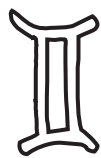

SUDOKU PUZZLE

The objective of the game is to fill all the blank squares in a game with the correct numbers. There are three very simple constraints to follow. In a 9 by 9 square Sudoku game:

- Every row of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order.
- Every column of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order.
- Every 3 by 3 subsection of the 9 by 9 square must include all digits 1 through 9.

Every Sudoku game begins with some squares already filled in, and the difficulty of each game is due to how many squares are filled in. The more squares that are known, the easier it is to figure out which numbers go in the open squares. As you fill in squares

correctly, options for the remaining squares are narrowed and it becomes easier to fill them in.

Sudoku Tips: Start by looking for numbers that occur frequently in the initial puzzle. For example, say you have a lot of 5's in the initial puzzle. Look for the 3x3 box where there is no 5. Look for 5's in other rows and columns that can help you eliminate where the 5 might go in the box. If there is a 5 in columns 1 and 2, then there can't be a 5 anywhere else in either of those columns. You know then that whatever leftmost 3x3 box that is missing a 5 must have it go in column 3. If you can eliminate all the possibilities in that box except for 1 square, you've got it down!
