The 2019 Visual Communications Design Portfolio Show, the annual event for visual communication and interior design students to show off their accumulated work is on April 30.

This year's theme is "Shift: Design Moving Forward", which was pitched by 2nd year visual communications major, Jessica Valle.

When I asked Jessica about this year's theme, "Shift: Design Moving Forward", she had this to say:

"When I created the name for the show and the tagline, I was trying to find a common thread between all of us in the Design Department. So, that's where I came up with 'Shift: Design Moving Forward'; as design students, we are all in a state of transition whether that be 1st year to 2nd year, or 2nd year to a 4-year college, or 2nd year into the workforce. We're moving forward. Design is always moving forward, and if you want to get really philosophical about it - we are ALL in a state of transition, 'shifting' in one way or another in our lives."

Jessica's own portfolio includes 12 projects focusing on branding and marketing, some of which were for real companies including: Golden Spring company of Bellbrook, Ohio and the YMCA of Greater Dayton. She also designed a cd for local artist Rick Lee James, as well as a fictional Dog Cafe to honor her dog, Baylee.

Jessica, who has 10 years of photography experience and works for the YMCA of Greater Dayton as their Digital Media Specialist.

"The event is really for all the graduating students to give them a chance to show off their professional portfolio and present it to faculty and family," said Joy Hardin, associates of applied science in interior design major, who will be participating in this year's event.

She went on to add:

"I am excited, although on a normal day, in the middle of a bunch of projects and assignments, it's easy to lose sight of the final goal. Graduation is sneaking up fast! From what I remember from last year's event, all the first years present their work for evaluation while the second years attend a panel of alumni and faculty in the building 12 auditorium. They share stories, advice, and answer any questions the graduates may have. Then it swaps and the second years set up their assigned table to best show their work."

"My project for the event is my portfolio which is the culmination of all my projects over the last two years. It's taking the best of my projects and making them even better so that I can present my work to potential employers and clients. Interior design students have both residential and commercial projects to show. It's a chance to show off the best of our creativity."

"All the first years are required to participate in the portfolio show to give us the experience of what it's like to present our work."

"The goal of the Shift Design Portfolio Show goes in a lot of directions, I think. It's a place for first years to get an honest opinion from a professional. It's a time for first years to look at 2nd year's work and see what is possible for them in the coming year," said Valle about the show.

She went on to add:

"For 2nd year students, it's a time of pride for all the hard work we've

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done, but it's also the end of our Design classes at Sinclair. For teachers, it's about seeing the fruit of their labor. For parents, it's about seeing their children succeed. And for our Portfolio team, it's about making sure the event goes well and then taking a LONG nap the next day. Because we're gonna need it."

"It's a very exciting time for us," Said Stephen Hollenbeck, visual communications major and member of the 2019 design team, along with Jessica Valle.

"We put countless hours into our portfolios and to finally have people see just what we've designed in our classes and provide feedback is amazing. I hope students from other majors will stop by during the open floor to see what us crazy designers have been up to." The 2019 Design team for the event consists of Jessica Valle, Elizabeth Peterson, Justin Pokorski, Chris Pugh and production assistant Stephen Hollenbeck.

The event will be held in Sinclair Conference Center, building 12, with the show begins at 3:30 p.m. with a Design Forum: Alumni Presentation/ Panel Discussion.

The portfolio assessments will begin after that at 6 p.m., and an open house that is welcome to friends and family will begin at 7:45 p.m. and run until 8:30 p.m.

Gem City Comic Con

The annual Gem City Comic Con (often shortened to GCCC) is fast approaching, bringing comics, pop culture and gaming galore to the Dayton area.

Currently, in its 14th year, GCCC will be returning to the Dayton Convention Center on April 27 from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. and April 28 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Originally located in the Student Union building at Wright State University, the convention moved to the Nutter Center in 2013. Three years later, it switched locations again, this time to downtown Dayton after attendance grew to 5,500.

"The move needed to be made," mentioned Jesse Noble, the organizer of GCCC, at the time of the relocation.

"It's a great location logistically because we don't have to cart people around town. We're in walking distance of all the great night spots and restaurants downtown Dayton has to offer. At the Nutter Center, you're by the mall, which is fine too, but there's not as much easily accessible culture for convention guests and attendees out in Fairborn."

Guests in past years have included Arvell Jones, a comic illustrator for Marvel and DC Comics, and Kyle Starks, writer of the graphic novel "Kill Them

All" and various "Rick And Morty" comic issues.

This year, announced creators include voice actor and writer Frank James Bailey, artist Matt Horak and illustrator Ray-Anthony Height.

GCCC, unlike bigger

conventions such as Cincinnati Comic Expo and Wizard World Cleveland, does not feature pop culture celebrities from video games, television shows or movies. Its sole focus is comic books and the writers and illustrators behind those books.

"Some shows do media guests and we don't do that," stated Noble. "We don't get the big door returns of some of those shows, but we can stay true to our focus, and that's what's important to us. We've gotten good at what we do, and we're sticking to it. We're not New to the Gem City scene in 2018 was the Game Developer's Lab, a section of the convention dedicated to locally-designed board, trading card and role-playing games.

"The idea is simple," reads the GCCC website. "While you are at The Gem City Comic Con you can experience new and innovative tabletop games designed by local game developers. You will be able to playtest and demo newly created gaming systems, expansions and homebrews from innovative minds that aim to make their mark in the gaming world."

A popular attraction at last year's convention? "Galatune," a trading card game designed by Daytonian Adam Wik that involves between two and five players attacking each other simultaneously in order to earn Victory Points.

GCCC also hosts a cosplay contest, panel discussions and various dealers selling comic books and other merchandise.

"The convention has definitely taken on a life of its own," explained Noble. "I knew there was an audience for it but I didn't know it would get so big. It was always my hope it would, and we've still got some growing to do, but I'm always flattered and humbled by the turnout we get from the fans in Dayton."

Interested attendees can buy tickets on the GCCC website or in person at Bell Book And Comic, a Dayton comic shop, for \$10.

April 27 and 28, single day tickets can be purchased at the Dayton Convention Center for \$10 or \$8 if the attendee is in costume, with early entry costing five dollars more.

Woman Attacked by Jaguar at Arizona Zoo

On Saturday, March 9, a woman visiting the Wildlife World Zoo, Aquarium & Safari Park, an Arizona zoo, was mauled by a jaguar. Early reports came out saying that she jumped the zoo barrier in an attempt to take a selfie with the animal.

A witness said they heard someone screaming for help and rushed over to find the woman with her arm pulled up against the jaguar's enclosure with the big cat's claws stuck into her arm. They were able to distract the wild animal by pushing a bottle into its cage to get it away from the woman.

The zoo released a statement saying that according to witnesses, the woman crossed the barrier for a photo of the animal and at no time was the animal out of its cage. In addition, reports claim she was not in the enclosure. Wildlife World Zoo, Aquarium & Safari Park also informed people that the woman received no life threatening injuries from the jaguar.

The woman involved later came forward to say that she was not trying to take a selfie with the jaguar, but was just reaching over the barrier for pictures of the wild animal. She explained that she and her family saw that the big cat was against the barrier and thought they could snap a few good pictures.

She admits to being in the wrong for leaning over the barrier but says that the zoo should move their barrier back, saying, "Anybody can reach out. I'm not the first, and if they don't move the fence, I'm probably not going to be the last."

Also in the statement, she voiced that she feels horrible about the bad media the zoo is getting and realizes that it was her mistake. She made it clear that she loves the zoo and visits it frequently.

According to the video of the incident and statements released, the only injuries were gashes on her arm, for which she received several stitches at the hospital.

This is not the first time a jaguar attack has happened at this particular zoo. Last summer, at the same enclosure with the same jaguar, a man was clawed and received stitches as well.

Both people said that the zoo barriers around the jaguar's enclosure are too close and want the Wildlife World Zoo, Aquarium & Safari Park to move it back further than the current length of three feet.

The zoo says that the barriers are up to code and that their rules just simply weren't being followed.

People on social media were reaching out to the zoo after news of the incident broke out, asking what would happen to the jaguar. The zoo responded by saying that the jaguar will not be euthanized for a human's mistake; she is a wild animal, and not at fault when the rules are not followed.

For now, the jaguar has been removed from the enclosure while the zoo is investigating the incident. There are no signs that its removal is permanent.

I've noticed that when some of my peers are on their phones, sometimes they don't even hear me when I talk. Meaning their phone is capturing their near undivided attention in certain instances.



Want the cool and rhythmic sound of live jazz curling into your ears while surrounded by curious and stunning works of art? Then you may be interested in visiting the Dayton Art Institute on select Thursdays starting March 14!

The "Bob Ross Auto Group Jazz and Beyond" is a series of jazz groups that come together and play music at the museum.

Doors open at 5 p.m. and all performances take place at 5:30-7:30 p.m. in the museum's Shaw Gothic Cloister.

Admission is free for museum members and \$8 for non-members. Food and drinks are available for cash purchase at each concert.

The season kicks off with the Classic Jazz Stompers on March 14, followed by the Kick-N-Flava on April 4.

Jazz singer and writer Duante Beddingfield will perform on July 11 and on August 8 Laney & The Tramps will play, featuring the Queen City Sisters.

Finishing the season will be the Joe Policastro Trio, who will perform on October 10 and the Puzzle of Light will play on Nov. 14.

The series celebrates 25 years of jazz at the Dayton Art Institute and is sponsored by the Bob Ross Auto Group.

Local groups and artists include the Classic Jazz Stompers, Kick-N-Flava, Duante Beddingfield and Puzzle of Light, who are all from the Dayton area. The Queen City Sisters come from Cincinnati.

Laney & The Tramps come to

the Gem City from Minnesota and the Joe Policastro Trio is based in Chicago.

The series contains a wide range from the jazz scene, from classic smooth jazz, rhythmic up-tempo jazz, to pop remakes that will fulfil the rich jazz culture presented at the museum.

"When you come to see our show, prepare to be entertained to the fullest," Kick-N-Flava said to the Dayton Daily News. "We're a high-energy, performing-type group that gets the people up and dancing."

The Classic Jazz Stompers, who will be performing on March 14, have been performing since the 1980s, reintroducing jazz from the 1920s and 30s to audiences ranging from their native Dayton area to spots around the country and even abroad.

Kick-N-Flava, performing on April 4, offers "soulful ballads, danceable R&B, smooth jazz, high-octane funk and contemporary pop." (Dayton Daily News)

The group has performed at the Five Rivers Metro Park Concert Series, as well as other events in the Dayton area.

Singer Duante Beddingfield brings a unique mixture of standard and modern pop into the classic jazz world and is the host of WYSO FM's "Equinox" jazz program. He performs regularly around the Dayton area, including Gilly's nightclub.

Laney & The Tramps was created by a group of four high school students with wonderous musical talent. They have opened for a TED talk presentation at the Zeitgeist Art Center in Louisiana and compose their own music. They also perform covers of jazz and blues artists.

Queen City Sisters is an a cappella women's trio with an arrangement of songs from the 1930s through the 50s. They have performed all over Cincinnati, spreading a little "Hollywood glamour" to local areas, as well as across the country.

The Joe Policastro Trio is a Chicago-based alternative jazz trio known for their open-minded style while keeping to the acoustic jazz they're so well known for. Their wide range of musical style is portrayed in their original music as well as in covers they do. They have even performed for former U.S. president Barack Obama.

The last group of the series, Puzzle of Light, plays from "jazz and rock to ethnic and world music" (Dayton Local). Their music is made up of flutes, harmonica, vocals and percussion. The group's music depict their love for nature and world cultures, adding a distinctive sound to the jazz world. The local group performs around the Dayton area, including colleges.

All seating for the event is general admission.

JONAS BROTHERS RETURN

Anyone who grew up in the mid 2000s remembers when those three dark haired boys took over the airwaves with "Year 3000." Nick, Joe and Kevin Jonas, aka the Jonas Brothers, had just begun their rise to fame.

Disney latched on to their newfound success by putting them in EVERYTHING, as Disney tends to do with those they've got their eye on.

From new albums, to starring in their own TV show as well as made for Disney Channel Channel movies such as "Camp Rock," the Jonas Brothers left their mark.

Perhaps the weirdest and most memorable of these was when they played the singing Cherubs in "Night at the Museum 2." Fans had their posters, their merchandise, and their CDs. The 2000s were the era of the Jonas Brothers, and it was a wonderful time.

Then, in 2013, tragedy struck; The brothers announced their split following a hiatus in 2009. It was a rough time for fans, as we had only what they left us with to get by.

same songs over and over to get us through, with all of us silently hoping it was just a temporary split. After all, they were just about college age. Maybe they wanted to go to school and then come back?

Kevin chose not to go the musical route, and instead founded a construction company called Jonas Werner. He became the co-CEO of The Blu Market, a social media influence company, and also starred in "Married to Jonas"," a short lived TV show about his life with Danielle.

Finally, after six years, Jonas Brothers fans felt a disturbance in the force. On Feb. 28, the Jonas Brothers' social media account went dark, and all posts were deleted from their Instagram, causing a frenzy among fans.

Rumors of a reunion swirled and were finally confirmed with the release of "Sucker," the Jonas Brothers'

The "Sucker" music video dropped on March 1, 2019. It featured the brothers as well as their wives (or in Joe's case, wifeto-be) in a mansion type setting, with elements of an "Alice in Wonderland" type feel.

It features the wives in lavish dresses doing different chores and the boys almost mimicking what the girls do. It's always a bold move to feature significant others in videos, as fans tend to be the jealous type when it comes to boybands.

However, the fans of the Jonas Brothers seem to be a different breed altogether. Since Danielle and Kevin, fans have always supported their choices in significant others. They're also the first to defend them when someone tries to tear down the boys or their wives.

The Jonas Brothers didn't stop at just a song release, however. They took to the TV, spending a week being featured in segments on James Corden's "The Late Late Show."

From "Carpool Karaoke" to "Fill Your Guts, Spill Your Guts," the boys were all about promoting their new song and their return. They even parodied "Year 3000" with a new version called "Year 2019."

The interview during "Carpool Karaoke" gave us what we'd been lacking - the reason behind the split. While some details are still murky, it is now known that Nick was the reason for the split.

Accessibility and Counseling Services, in partnership with the Diversity Office, is excited to announce that Temple Grandin will be making a visit to Sinclair to tell her story.





Reverend Janglebones' Soap-Box: Little Green Men

The birds are back, baby! The evenings are longer and the outside smells like the outside again. When spring hits its regularly scheduled stride it's hard not to carry it in your own step.

It seems like just when you've begun to acclimate to the slower pace of winter the spirit of its peppy successor steps in and simply can't resist, in its childlike wonder, to smash the big green button of life's triumphant return.

I'm getting poetic with this because there does seem to be an almost eerily specific quality to spring. Some kind of archetype that has been perceived and depicted by many cultures in ways that leave the question of coincidence up to just about any curious observer.

The Green Man of Spring is a myth that, strangely, shows up in ancient architecture and ruins from Eastern Asia all the way to North America. Many of these instances occurring completely independently of one another and at different points in history.

These smiling, gnarly gnome like faces (surrounded in a frame of leaves or vines) were depicted in holy buildings and jewelry, both secular and ecclesiastical. As if it were a fact of the world that all ancient people could plainly see, regardless of their religion, faith or doctrine.

Dalua, as the Celts called him, was always a representation of new life. Of fertility and sustenance and the sort of dewy-eyed Disney love of innocence and cute little baby woodland animals. Alternatively, one wouldn't be amiss if they caught a whiff of Dionysus' or Bacchus' wine in the air, as they are also widely associated with the more adult side of the Green Man (after dark).

It does however, as ancient legends often do, get darker.

The Aztec had a deity they called Tlaloc that they believed controlled the rains. Now, connecting an occurrence in nature to the divine is natural (it's an effective means to understand both nature and the divine), but the way in which a culture does so is entirely the choice of that culture, alone. I know all of this logically, and still I'll have a hard time sleeping after thinking about the slave children who were sacrificed to ensure the timely arrival of the rains each year.

There is no way to judge this form of worship, as there is simply no comparison between their now longgone world and the one in which we have theologians and newspapers, but



it's bone chilling just the same.

That is just one dark interpretation of the Spirit of Spring. There are far more positive relationships forged with the Green Man than not. One of my favorites is 13th Century "Parzival" by German author Wolfram von Eschenbach.

It is a romance tale of an innocence and pure love: two things Parzival had to possess as prerequisites, for he was to be steward of the Holy Grail and keep it safe until the coming of Arthur the King. Parzival's bravery was drawn from his pure love and, through its might, he accomplished heroic and legendary deeds.

That's kind of a lot to live up to, but sometimes having the courage to let one's own innocence show, and forgetting about fear for a while, can be truly inspiring to those who have the desire, if not the courage, to smash the big green button themselves.

The English women's rugby team, known as the Red Roses, is looking for redemption after losing the Women's Six Nations Grand Slam last year to France.

This time, the Roses are undefeated. With the end in sight, the girls are excited to reclaim their rightful title as Grand Slam Champions.

England emerged victorious in their most recent matchup against Italy 55-0, which marks the third time this season the women have scored over 50 points. Previously, the Roses beat Ireland (51-7) and Wales (51-12). In addition, they also defeated France 41-26.

At first, Italy was giving the Roses a run for their money but that all changed when wing Jess Breach put England on the board in the 13th minute. "As the Red Roses we have the responsibility to act as role models for women and girls who are looking to get into rugby and hopefully by bringing the women's game to Exeter and other parts of the country we can do our bit in getting more people involved," center Lagi Tuima told CNN.

Flanker Sarah Beckett was also excited about the influx of spectators as she spoke with Sky Sports. "As the game's growing we're getting more exposure and it's great to see. We're still getting to know each other and having this crowd supporting us, we can't ask for more."

The Red roses will play their final game against Scotland next Saturday. Scotland has yet to secure a win this season.

Scotland felt they were on the path to victory during their game against Wales, but after a try from Wales' Bethan Lewis and a kick from Robyn Wilkins, the score was tied 10-10 at halftime.

Things began to look up for the team in the second half after Chloe Rollie's try put Scotland ahead 15-10, but Siwan Lillicrap tied the game once more and Lleucu George was able to make a conversion to give Wales the win.

France is currently in third place, but only trails Italy by one point. If they defeat Ireland on Saturday, they can easily move to second place. However, if France loses, England will win the title.



Promethea, The 20th Anniversary

On March 12, Vertigo Comics (a DC Comics imprint) will be releasing a new 20th anniversary deluxe edition for book one of the reality bending comic book series "Promethea," authored by legendary writer Alan Moore.

Moore, known for his deeply imaginative storylines and his self identification as an anarchist and occultist (in 1993, at the age of 40, he declared himself to be a ceremonial magician), is the creative mind behind some of the comic book world's most infamous stories.

Of these stories include the critically acclaimed "Watchmen" series, the "Superman: Whatever Happened to the Man of Tomorrow?" series, the "V for Vendetta" graphic novel (which was later made into a film in 2005), and his 2016 fiction novel "Jerusalem".

His most famous work (which happens to be my favorite comic book story) is his 1988 graphic novel "Batman: The Killing Joke," which introduced a new Joker origin story that many have taken as the Joker's "true" background prior to becoming The Clown Prince of Crime.

In 1986, Moore's "Watchmen" was published by DC Comics, which garnered much praise and positive reviews. The comic was later adapted to the big screen in 2009.

Promethea, which was published in 1999 by America's Best Comics, is possibly Moore's most ambitious project, with the series being an intricate and complex thirty two issue story that spanned over the course of six years, the final issue being printed in April 2005.

The story involves a college student named Sophie Bangs, living in a futuristic version of New York in 1999.

For the subject of her term paper, Sophie chooses to write about Promethea, a fictional character that has appeared in numerous poems, newspapers, and comics for several decades.

While in the process of working on her paper, Sophie attempts to interview a woman named Barbara Shelley, the widow of the last person to ever write a comic about Promethea, but Barbara promptly shuts her down and gives her a cryptic warning about "looking for folklore." Later on as the story progresses, Sophie soon discovers that Promethea is not just a mythological character, but is actually a powerful entity whose aim is to usher in the apocalypse.

She also learns that the mystical being known as "Promethea" was originally born in the 5th century AD as the daughter of a magician and has existed for over a thousand years. For generations, Promethea has merged herself within the consciousness of others, using their bodies as vessels, with Sophie being next in line.

Like many of his other stories, Moore's "Promethea" is littered throughout with references to the occult, Aleister Crowley, "magick" and if that weren't enough to make you scratch your head in confusion, each issue that was printed is based on the "tree of life."

If you look at a diagram of the tree of life, you'll notice that there are ten nodes along with twenty two lines (known as "paths"). Add ten and twenty two together, you get the number thirty two, which is the number of volumes that "Promethea" consists of.

Diving in further, the final, 32nd issue of the series is made up of thirty

two pages, with each individual page expounding upon one of the paths that lead to each node, the nodes themselves representing aspects of God, consciousness, existence and the human psyche.

So far, I've only read two of Alan Moore's stories ("Watchmen" and "The Killing Joke"), but after seeing a brief YouTube clip about "Promethea" during Spring Break, I've already reserved my copy from the public library in anticipation to have my mind blown.
