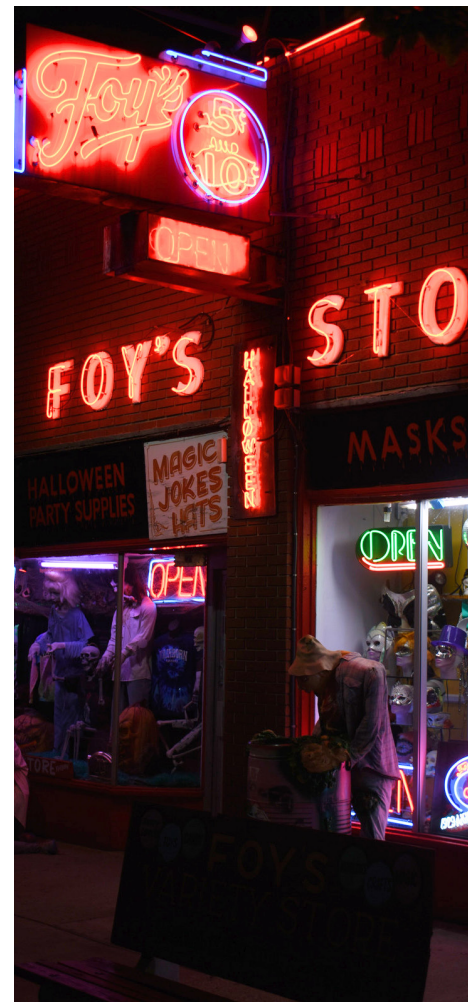

SINCLAIR CAMPUS HISTORY

Sinclair's Roots Continue To Inspire Today

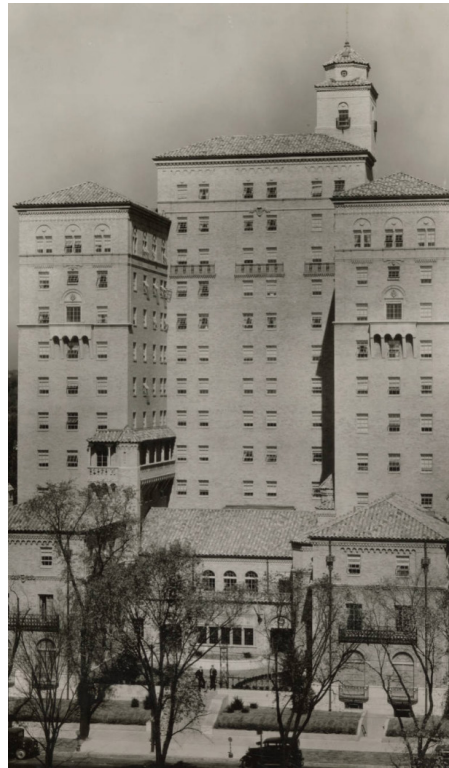
According to an old proverb, the best indicator of the future is the past. For Sinclair's sprawling Dayton campus, nothing could be more fortuitous. As students and faculty prepare to celebrate the completion of another year downtown, there's no better time to look back and reflect on how Sinclair's roots continue to inspire in the present.

The story of Sinclair's downtown campus is one of ambitiously promoting educational opportunities. The college's roots date back to the late 19th century, when it was founded as the educational department of the local YMCA. While it may be difficult for us to picture what the Dayton area must have been like at the time, it's easy for us to appreciate just how linked education and economic opportunity has always been. Once a major hub of industrial development in the Midwest, the Gem City would be no different to other important centers of growth in the US at the time. Education, then and now, was key to the post-Civil War economic boom in the country. In 1887, Sinclair was founded with the vision of making that happen for as many people as possible.

According to Shelby Beatty, Archivist and Records Manager at the college, Sinclair was established based on its founder's desire to help locals gain access to education. In a time where most Americans did not complete high-school, the college's eponymous founder David Sinclair sought to give residents access to the industrial boom sweeping the nation. Despite the change in times, the twinning of economic prosperity and learning remains relevant today. Beatty said, "Back in the 1880s, a lot of people were being left behind

because they lacked the technical knowledge required for many of those new jobs. David Sinclair figured that education was the best

way to prepare locals to enter the



Beatty said, "The first seven buildings of what became our home are hugely significant. They would open in 1972 and allow us to begin

expanding rapidly. In the late 60s,

workforce."

"Our college has really stuck close to that model. Even today, we are always looking to serve students in ways that best prepare them for life after graduation," she added.

According to Beatty, Sinclair was located within the YMCA's building on Ford Street until 1908, when they moved to the current location of the Dayton City Hall. In 1948, the college would officially be named Sinclair College of the YMCA. By 1959, it would separate from the YMCA and begin looking for a new home. They would break ground on the site of the current campus in 1969, an area that was part of Dayton's Urban Renewal Area.

we had around 2,000 students enrolled. By the fall semester of 72 we had 6,500 students. It has only grown from there. We have never had a rollback in enrollment, and it was those first seven buildings that allowed us to expand so quickly."

Beatty added, "Our campus truly represents the ideals of equal opportunity. When Sinclair initially opened in 1887, only men were allowed to enroll. But from 1920 onward the college has served everyone in the wider Miami Valley region. If you need an education or help getting to the next step employment-wise, Sinclair has become the place to go."

Sinclair Spotlight: International Education on Ukraine

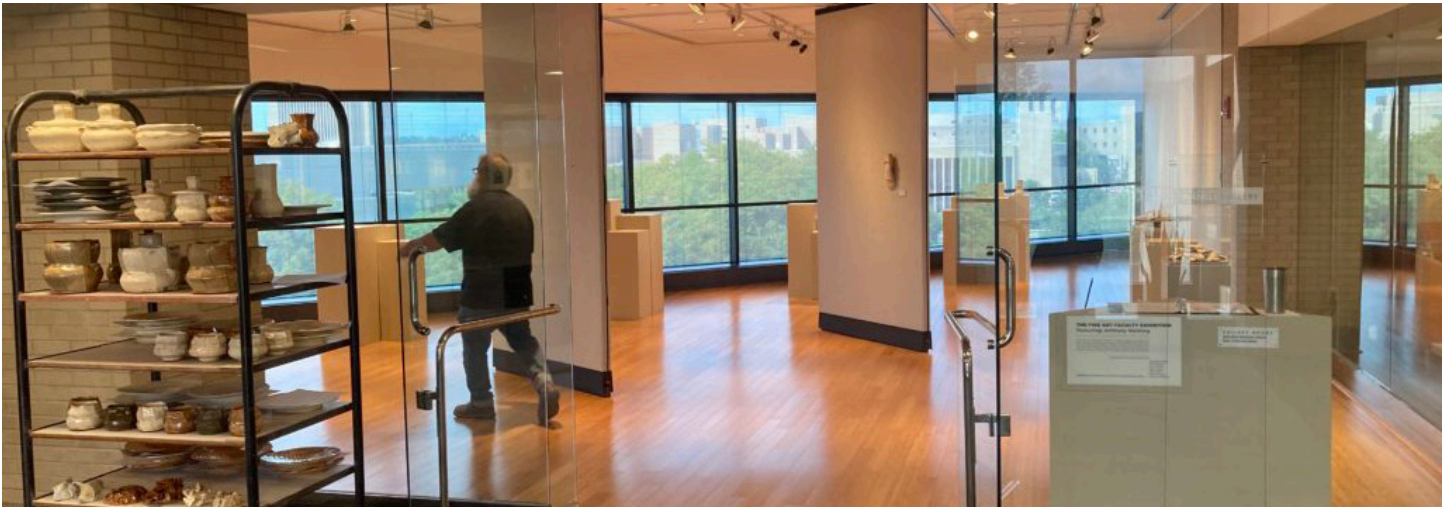

"We have many spaces where

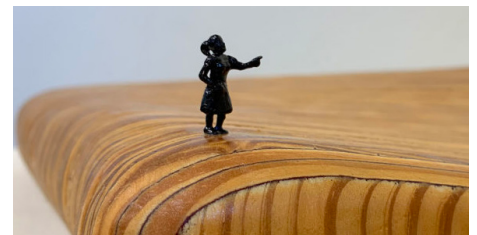

According to Grieve, the artwork on display is changed regularly throughout the year. Calls are put

out for art to different institutions and across social media. After submissions are made, a committee reviews each work to determine which ones will be displayed on campus. To Grieve, who is responsible for ensuring art on campus is taken care of and displayed properly, it is more than an opportunity to educate students and visitors to Sinclair.

"I have always enjoyed art and fell into the role of gallery director at a local organization. It was great working with artists and being a part of the gallery setting, I fell in love with it. MIDTERM ESSENTIALS

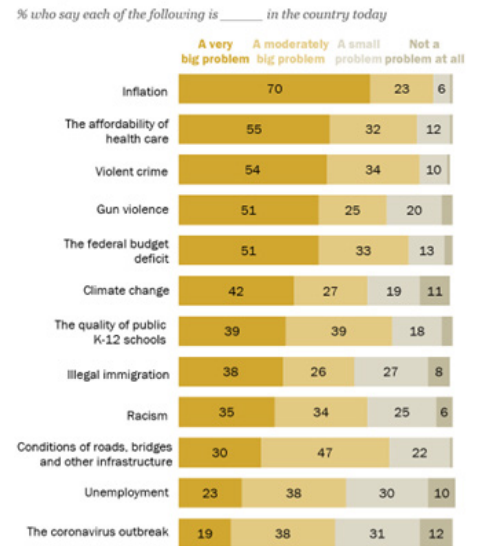
Key issues voters will face at the 2022 Midterm Elections

As we inch closer to the long-awaited midterm election there are a few hot topics you should know about before casting your vote.

Though the presidential position won't be up for grabs this November, many congressional seats are. The 2022 midterms will task constituents, as voters will need to select state representatives that support their views on hard-hitting matters and enforce them in both the House and Senate.

Emmy Award-winning meteorologist Bernadette Woods Placky, who acts as the Chief Meteorologist and Program Director at Climate Central, wants Americans to know that the global climate crisis is real—not a hoax. During her presentation, Placky highlighted many eye-opening figures. However, Placky provided a statistic by the European Centre for Medium-Range Weather Forecast (ECMWF) that puts our climate's fate into stark perspective. Without climate control, by the year 2100, Ohio can expect to see a 7.9°F increase in Summer temperatures. So, what does this mean? It means that Ohio and surrounding states will start maintaining a climate similar to that of Shreveport, Louisiana. "Louisiana and other southern states will start seeing climates comparable to that of the Middle East," says Placky.

Larry Levitt, the Executive Vice president of the Kaiser Family Foundation (KFF) also took to the stage. Levitt centered his talking points around the major healthcare and drug cost issues that congress is facing, such as drug price regulation. From requiring inflation rebates to limit annual increases, capping out-of-pocket spending at 2,000 per year, to even reducing the price of insulin to \$35 per month for Medicare and private insurance enrollees, Levitt made note of the many stances that are currently being considered in Congress. After consulting public opinion, the KFF found that a majority of Americans favor the medicare negotiation, even across party lines.

Though, these are just a few of the topics you should consider before heading out to your local polling location. Expect to see representatives supporting varying stances surrounding abortion, gun control, and immigration on your ballot as well. Remember, democracy is in the hands of the people. So, save the date for November 8th.

In July, I had the opportunity to represent The Clarion in Columbus, Ohio, at the Midterm Essentials: Deep Dive on Key Policy Issues, a workshop hosted by Poynter. The Poynter Institute, based out of St. Petersburg, Florida, serves as a non-profit organization that aims to educate journalists while maintaining a strong focus on how to avoid misinformation.

Led by leading field specialists, attendees were exposed to fact-checked and peer-reviewed analytics on pressing term issues. First of which is the emerging threat of climate change.

I also had the chance to sit in on a conversation with author, Emmy winner, and The Overshoot founder, Matthew Klein. Klein has quite the reputation as he's held jobs at the Economist, Bloomberg, and The Financial Times just to name a few. "The public views inflation as the top problem facing the United States— and no other concern comes close" says, Klein as he underscores a 2022 survey from the Pew Research Center. The poll showed that 70% of the adults surveyed viewed inflation as a "very big problem in the country today".

RECIPES



Homemade Caramel Apples

Ingredients

- Use 8-10 apples depending on size
- 10 skewers for apples
- 22 oz caramels, unwrapped, from two 11 oz bags
- 4 Tbsp heavy whipping cream
- Dash of salt

Optional: Sprinkles, Mini M&M's, melted chocolate for drizzling, crushed pretzels and chopped peanuts

Instructions

1. If using store-bought apples, you should remove the wax coating first. Dip apples in hot water for a few seconds then rub them with a towel to remove wax. Dry the Apples well. Remove stems and Insert Sticks into the top of the apples. Tip: refrigerating apples will help the caramel set faster while you prep toppings and melt caramel.
2. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone liner. Prepare toppings so they are ready to use.
3. Heat caramel, cream, and a pinch of salt over a double boiler or microwave for a few minutes stirring every 30 seconds until caramel is melted and smooth.

4. Roll apples in caramel, dipping apples sideways to coat to the top. Allow excess to drip back into the bowl. Scrape off the bottom of the apple against the side of the bowl so you do not get too much caramel pooling at the bottom.

5. If you see a lot of air bubbles in your caramel start to form or if it gets too thick, then rewarm it slightly. If caramel so too runny, let it cool slightly before using.

6. Immediately after dipping in caramel, roll apples into your toppings or leave them plain if desired. Refrigerate for at least 15 minutes or until caramel is set before drizzling with melted chocolate and enjoying.

Pumpkin Spice Hot Chocolate

Ingredients

- 1 cup milk
- ¼ cup milk chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon cocoa powder
- 1½ teaspoons pumpkin puree
- ¼ teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- ¼ cup whipped cream
- Cinnamon and nutmeg to sprinkle on top

Instructions

1. In a saucepan over medium heat whisk together the milk, chocolate chips and cocoa powder.
2. Heat until chocolate chips melt and hot chocolate is smooth, it takes a couple minutes. Keep whisking so it does not burn or stick to the bottom of the pan.
3. Stir in the pumpkin puree and the pumpkin pie spice until it is well blended. Pour into two mugs and top with whipped cream. Sprinkle with cinnamon and nutmeg.
