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

CUTURAL THANKSGIVING

One of the most beautiful things about America is our cultural melting pot; the concept of blending traditions and customs from around the world. Food is often a cultural staple and Thanksgiving is a hallmark of traditional homestyle American cooking. However not everyone is planning for a traditional Rockefeller table! As more families embrace a multicultural look on the holiday and creativity in the kitchen our tables can look remarkably different region to region and family to family.

The vegan and vegetarian diet culture/lifestyle has been gaining more popularity thoughout the last decade. For moral or health reasons, many Americans avoid eating meat or animal byproducts (dairy). Vegan families favor meat alternatives like tofu turkey. With the rise in market demand, beyond meat versions of turkey are more common than ever. Some opt to skip the turkey alltogether, focusing on creating other sides for their diet. Even if a family is not fully vegan or vegetarian, many will make dishes specifically for members who are.

Southern families will often have soul food - d ishes primarily inspired by the historical cooking style of enslaved people, alongside Native American cooking traditions. The name Soul Food gained popularity during the Civil Rights movement, when the many contributions of African Americans were finally getting greater recognition. Southern families may have Hoppin John, hushpuppies, macaroni, and grits on the menu.

Families near the southern border will often have Tex-Mex dishes. Tex-Mex is a fusion cuisine of Southern American and Mexican cooking primarily inspired by the Tejano people of Texas. Tex-Mex often is used to refer to Americanized Mexican dishes and American created dishes in the same style. Many families may have enchiladas, tamales, and chili con carne. Texas is the most popular place in America to deep fry the Thanksgiving turkey. Many Hispanic and Latino families may favor serving similar dishes authentic to their heritage as well.

Italian Americans, especially in New York and New Jersey may give guests a charcuterie board or a soup course of tortellini en brodo prior to dinner. Staple Italian dishes pair surprisingly well with traditional Thanksgiving food. Baked ziti, lasagna, and manicotti are some common additions. Over 2 million Italians immigrated to America in the early 1900s. In 1930, over 1 million Italians called New York City home - a remarkable 17% of the entire city's population at the time. 



LESSONS FROM BOSNIA

I'll likely never forget the first Bosnians I ever met. Their door, yawning open and welcoming despite the cold Washington night; their pale faces, ruddy and framed by hollow cheeks; and their smiles, warm despite the brutal night outside. Like many Americans at the time, I was old enough to know the name of the land they came from and the conflict that drove them to our neighborhood, a world away from the place they'd called home for generations.

We'd seen the bombing of their cities, heard of the massacres perpetuated against their civilians. That night the war in Bosnia made its way to our apartment complex in SeaTac just as it would in Dayton, Ohio, where in Nov. 1995 an agreement would be made to put an end to the violence. For those with links to the Balkans, Nov. 21 is a date worth remembering for what the Dayton) Agreement achieved and for what it did not. Nearly twenty-seven years from the day an accord was made at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base to bring peace to a region ravaged by conflict, there remains plenty for us to learn today.

A Monument To Peace

Dr. Mary Ramey is the Project Coordinator for Dayton Peace Museum's exhibit on the accords and her passion for Bosnia and Herzegovina has helped educate the general public about the event's importance. Through her research, Ramey has become an expert on the conflict and its aftermath.

"Like many, my experience of the war was mostly on television, and I was aware of how horrific it was. When we say 'war' we think of two armies facing off, but that is not what this was. This war was waged against civilians," said Ramey. Through a series of textual and interactive screens replete with audio, Ramey's exhibit offers a state-of-the-art and in-depth look at the war from its inception. The walls are lined with mementos from the conflict as well, including a Serbian conscript's uniform and the Croatian president's plaque from the Hope Hotel. Dayton's role in the peace accords is also highlighted, beginning with the reason it was chosen to host the talks in the first place.

Ramey said, "They wanted a military installation so that the leaders involved would be isolated. Remember, this was 1995 so there were no smartphones and the internet was mostly email. They wanted them to focus on each other and find ways to get something done."

As a result, the Gem City would host the Presidents of Serbia and Montenegro, Croatia, and Bosnia and Herzegovina. "Wright-Patt had a total of six weeks' notice before 800 civilians descended on the base including negotiators, secretaries, researchers, translators, and communications teams. The presidents were put up in the visiting officers' quarters, which were standardized. No one received more space than the other," said Ramey.

Despite weeks of negotiations, they entered the morning of Nov. 21 1995 with a deal still uncertain. Those twists and turns are portrayed on the exhibit's interactive displays, a few taps of a screen revealing the real life drama unfolding behind closed doors.

Ramey said, "The actual accord is only three pages, but then there are 11 appendices. The agreement was initialed in Dayton because the Europeans insisted it be formally signed in Paris. Each president was told if they initialed it was binding."

Weeks later it would become official. Hostilities ended, a new country rose from the ashes of war, and reconciliation efforts began. But long-lasting peace would elude the region. Just a few years later, Kosovo would be the next flashpoint.

A People Under Siege

Memories of the war remain strong in Mostar. It would suffer heavily during a years-long siege that left much of the historic city in ruins. Opinions about the accord are as strong as those memories, I would learn from a local.

Selmir Hidovic, a translator from the region of Hercegovina, was a child when the conflict began.

"We had a very good life before it happened. In our city we had near 100 percent employment. We had cars and traveled. In that environment war struck us. Most people thought that it would not impact them, that it would not be a big deal because of how good life was for us at the time. They were wrong," Hidovic said.

Mostar would soon be encircled and bombarded. At just 12-years old, his family home was destroyed and would not be rebuilt until 2003, eight years after the signing of the Dayton Agreement. Even now, some families in Mostar still struggle.

"As human beings, we need to live with each other and tolerate each other in every sense to preserve peace because war brings nothing good to any side," he said.

The Way Forward

Around the world, many people from Bosnia and of Bosnian heritage continue to process the aftereffects of the war. They see the rise of nationalism and recognize the same patterns that led to the tragedy in the Balkans. A quick look at newsreels in the US and other countries where the rhetoric of hate has become so normalized fills them with a sense of déjà vu. Nedim Ridjanovic, a Bosnian American linguist, is one such person. He knows firsthand just what such rhetoric can lead to. It's something he sees spreading like poison

around the world.

"I was in the US during the war but my father and sister were in Sarajevo. I was able to call twice before the lines were cut. My father told me not to worry. We then had no idea what was going on until I received a letter through the Red Cross. I felt helpless," Ridjanovic said.

While his father and sister would manage to escape to safety, others would endure a brutal siege that shocked the world.

Those like him struggling for a more peaceful world know a lot more work lies ahead. Political marches in places as varied as Charleston and Budapest bring to the mind of many Bosnians the hate filled rallies that fueled conflict in Eastern Europe, while the politicians who inspire them use the same playbook as Milosevic and other politicians.

Ridjanovic said, "To prevent another Bosnia, education is absolutely vital. The more educated people we have, the more people we have that can exercise critical thinking so they will not be swayed by nationalistic arguments and propaganda. That is one reason we should strive to make education more affordable and accessible to all."

"We need people to value facts over opinions. And we need a free press to hold politicians accountable. That is a threat to any would-be dictator and nationalist." I could hear just how much this meant to Ridjanovic as he spoke. "Americans who have not experienced something like that do not know how lucky they are. That is how we can prevent an authoritarian regime from taking hold. It is imperative that we prevent that because we have seen in Bosnia and elsewhere what those kinds of regimes can do," Ridjanovic added.

SEIZE THE DATA By Mame Thiome

Data analytics is the decryption and the interpretation of statistical models. With the rapid mutation of technology and its increasing presence in all aspects of society, data has become a prominent element of our everyday life. Data science is what helps institutions observe, describe, and predict performances so they may take strategic actions accordingly. Although the discipline can be applied to any field of work, it is fervently used in the following: marketing, finances, computer sciences, online security, and information systems. Sinclair Community College, in addition to its Data Analytics associate degree, also offers a short-term certificate.

We sat down with Mr. Paul Hansford, Associate Professor in Sinclair's CS and IT department and the contact person for the Data Analytics program. According to Hansford, data analytics is an amazing field with great career opportunities.

"Data is more and more present everywhere, and there is a shortage of people to handle, manage and translate the information," said Hansford. "We are working on a new program that will facilitate the formation of new data analysts," he added.

Sinclair Community College, through the Data Analytics Pipeline Grant, wants to encourage minorities to get adequate training to become data analysts. With the Data Tech Grant, the school is also targeting College Credit Plus students, students at tech prep institutions, and those right out of high school. Starting Spring 2023, these grants will go into effect and new modules will be implemented to facilitate the pathway into data analytics careers. There are a great number of opportunities in data analytics. As Mr. Hansford said, data science offers skillsets that will allow you to build

a career in any field. Even if your interest is in community work,

you can put your skills into the service of people through what is known as "data kind."



Snickerdoodles

I love snickerdoodle cookies. They are simple to make.

You'll need:

cup butter
 1/2 cups sugar
 large eggs
 3/4 cups whole wheat flour/all-purpose flour

 tsp baking soda

 tbsp sugar
 tsp cinnamon

• Make the dough into 1-inch balls and roll in sugar/cinnamon mixture Place them evenly spaced on the chilled cookie sheet.

 $\cdot\,$ Bake at 350-degree F for 10 minutes.

Remove from the cookie sheet to cool.

• In a large bowl mix pumpkin, eggs, oil, water, vanilla, and sugar until well blended.

- Line with paper or spray muffin pans. Fill about 2/3 full.
